Letter from the Chair

T'S HARD TO BELIEVE that autumn is arriving in the Puddle Dock neighborhood. 2023 is flying by! This is in part due to the numerous milestones and celebrations at Strawbery Banke and in the greater community. In addition to Portsmouth's quadricentennial, the Museum celebrates 30 years of roleplaying and the 30th annivesary of the opening of the Abbott Store.

In addition to these many anniversary celebrations, Strawbery Banke hosted the first ever Piscataqua Powwow, a wonderful intertribal celebration that occured on Puddle Dock on August 12 & 13. The event served as a meaningful way to teach the greater Seacoast community about Native American culture and heritage. This is one of many ways the Museum is expanding the ways in which it shares stories of Native people, past and present, as a part of the Abenaki Heritage Initiative.

Speaking of milestones, on June 29, the Museum announced the completion of Building Community: The Campaign for Strawbery Banke. This campaign is the Museum's largest fundraising effort to date – garnering commitments of more than \$25 million! Funding priorities include restoring five historic houses as a part of the Heritage House Program, supporting the Museum's education and interpretation programs, protecting the historic houses from sea level rise, and increasing the endowment to support staffing and future initiatives.

Objects that Shaped the City



In celebration of the City of Portsmouth's 400th anniversary,

Strawbery Banke presents "Portsmouth Possessions: Objects that Shaped the City," a new exhibit for the 2023 season. Collections on view include objects featured in the book "A History of Portsmouth NH in 101 Objects," as well as textiles, furniture, portraits, samplers, and objects relating to local industries. Open daily through October 31. Included with general museum admission.

FROM THE COLLECTIONS



For some, fall means football season. Don Trefethen wore this football jersey (2023.1) during his time at Haven School, the elementary school Puddle Dock children attended. He claims no athletic ability, saying that Coach Clough put him on the team to warm the benches. The jersey was originally a shade of maroon. "When I received my football letter after the fifth-grade season I sewed the new letter on the shirt, replacing the old, faded, motheaten 'H' that had been there for many years. I speculate the shirt was used by many Haven School players from the 1940s until I first got it in the fall of 1961." Today, Mr. Trefethen leads tours at Strawbery Banke Museum, and his jersey is part of the "Portsmouth Possessions" exhibition, on view until October 31. His jersey is on display in the Pridham House.



30th Anniversary of Roleplaying

This year marks the 30th anniversary of Strawbery Banke's roleplaying program. With dozens of real Puddle Dock figures portrayed over the years, both by adult roleplayers and in roleplaying summer camps, this program has brought delight and education to visitors by immersing them in the daily life of the past. Guests and roleplayers have shared countless meaningful experiences since the program's debut in 1993.

Oracle House Archaeology

This summer Alix Martin, Archaeologist, directed a team of volunteers in exploring the Museum's property at the corner of Court and Marcy Streets. They were looking for material evidence of the so-called Great House, built in 1631. Throughout the two-week excavation, the team uncovered artifacts from the 17th-, 18th-, 19th-, and 20th-century history of the lot, but nothing that could be linked definitively to the Great House or the 1630s. However, work of the team has resulted in a much more complete understanding of how this lot was used over time, including evidence of the demolition of the 19th-century variety store that was at this location before the Oracle House was moved to the site in 1937. Over the next year, Alix and the volunteers will clean and catalog the thousands of artifacts recovered.



Penhallow House Update

Strawbery Banke Museum recently began the restoration of the c1750 Penhallow House, located on the Museum grounds, facing Washington Street. The house is to undergo important restoration of both the exterior and interior. The exterior work began this summer and will include wet-proofing the basement to protect the home from the increasing impacts of groundwater. Once the building is restored Penhallow House will be open to the public and feature an exhibit interpreting a 20th-century Black experience of living in Puddle Dock.

Preservation Timber Framing, the company conducting the restoration of Penhallow, is beginning the careful work of creating a wet-proof basement, a major step in the Museum's groundwater-intrusion adaptation strategy. The house will be lifted approximately 10 feet into the air using hydraulics, structural steel, and cribbing. After the house is lifted, gravel and filter fabric will be added to the basement to encourage drainage to perimeter drains and the City of Portsmouth's stormwater system. A new concrete foundation will be poured and faced with existing foundation material.

Funding for the Penhallow House restoration was provided in part by grants from the National Endowment for the Humanities: Democracy demands wisdom (NEH) and the New Hampshire Land and Community Heritage Investment Program (LCHIP). Additionally, funding came through the Cogswell Benevolent Trust, the Samuel P. Hunt Foundation, and the McIninch Foundation, as well as from an anonymous grantor and private donations to the Building Community: the Campaign for Strawbery Banke.

The Living Collection at Strawbery Banke

Did you know that the many trees and woody plants are a part of Strawbery Banke's living collection? The Museum's woody plant and tree collection totals more than 350 specimens and nearly 90 different species. Some of the trees in this collection date back to the 1930s and earlier. These specimens make a collection of plants that serve critical functions for the local ecosystem, including carbon sequestration, ground and surface water mitigation, and temperature regulation.

With the help of tree service companies, the Landscape Horticulture Department works hard to keep these plants healthy and thriving despite the challenges of increasing variability of weather, soil compaction, road runoff, and reduced air quality. When you next visit the Museum, pay closer attention to the living collection and enjoy the shade!













Campaign Event Recap

On Thursday, June 29, nearly 300 donors and friends of Strawbery Banke Museum gathered on Puddle Dock to celebrate the successful conclusion of the Building Community: The Campaign for Strawbery Banke. Chaired by former Trustee Zach Slater, the campaign raised \$25.2 million, almost doubling the \$13 million original goal. Funds raised will support a myriad of projects, including restoration and interpretation of several SBM historic properties, such as Penhallow House, which will tell the story of an African American experience in Portsmouth. The campaign was highlighted by a \$5 million gift from Martha Fuller Clark and the late Dr. Geoffrey Clark, which helped establish an endowment focused on bringing Strawbery Banke staff salaries closer to industry standards.
