Historic House Updates

Strawbery Banke staff and contractors are hard at work on several projects to preserve the Museum's historic houses.



Captain Walsh House, c. 1796 — This hands-on exhibit invites visitors to examine furniture, open drawers, look inside trunks, search in the garden, and explore anything that strikes curiosity. The exterior of the house will be painted over the summer. The Captain Walsh House exhibit has been made possible in part by the Institute of Museum

and Library Services.

Goodwin Mansion, c. 1811 — Strawbery Banke is replacing the



wood gutters and roof on the Goodwin Mansion. In order to replace the roof, the balustrade (architectural feature) was removed, repaired, and repainted. As part of the Museum's commitment

to bringing sustainability and resiliency to all projects, modifications to the gutter system to accommodate the larger amounts of rainwater the region now experiences on a regular basis are being installed.

Penhallow House, c. 1750 — Phase one of the Penhallow House project (foundation and exterior restoration) has been made possible in part by National Endowment for the Humanities, LCHIP, Cogswell Benevolent Trust, the Samuel P. Hunt Foundation, and the McIninch Foundation. As part of the overall Sea Level Rise Initiative, exciting opportunities to mitigate groundwater in the basement are being explored.

Sherburne House, c. 1695 — The Sherburne House project continues throughout the summer. Strawbery Banke is partnering with architectural historian Bill Finch to create plans as well as contracting with an engineer to determine how to rebuild the chimney on a groundwater-impacted basement. The Museum will soon have results from the engineer which will help us determine the design of a new chimney.

The Yeaton-Walsh House, c. 1803 — The Yeaton-Walsh House is currently being painted in new colors. Paint analysis has revealed that the body of the house was originally an ochre color, and the trim a dark green. The contrast is striking after so many years of the house being white. The roof will also be completed this year.

FROM THE COLLECTIONS



As Strawbery Banke prepares for Vintage & Vine — A Wine Festival in Historic Style, the Collections Department shares this creamware Monteith bowl (2001.38), usually found in the Chase House dining room. These unique vessels were made to cool wine glasses by resting the base of the glass upside down in the grooves of

the rim. One would then fill the body with ice water, thereby chilling the glasses.

When first introduced in the late seventeenth century, Monteiths were largely made of silver. Monteith bowls were named for a larger-than-life Scotsman, "Monsieur Monteigh," who likely had nothing to do with their production, and everything to do with using them for consumption. As Homer said, "wine can of their wits the wise beguile, Make the sage frolic, and the serious smile."

This rare English example dates to about 1780 and has a local history. Strawbery Banke purchased this bowl in 2001 from a private collection in Greenland, NH.
